The civilian of the flight "Feather Merchant" Maley, who lost his flap handle on the 180 degree stage.

"Hard Luck" Hayes, the toughest guy of the flight.

Oh, yes, the man who carried his own hole to walk in, our boy Stump" Pratt.

Our allied cadets numbered four. "Hopalong Hotspur" Merveille, who gave us a definite style of marching.
